

MANDATE: Under the authority of the Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation Chief and Council, the department's mandate is to promote and maintain the Stoney Language and History of the Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation and to develop Alexis as a bilingual community.

AUTHORITY: The Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation Elders are the Knowledge Keepers of the language and history and provide direction, guidance and support to the staff and program.

The Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation Stoney Language Program was initially formed in the year 1996 by the authority of the Alexis Chief and Council to teach the language at the school. To meet community needs, the program expanded and is now operating as the Alexis Heritage & Language Department. The department is governed and managed in accordance with the policies and procedures of the Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation.





All staff required to participate and join weekly staff meetings (as required), as well as monthly PR Day Staff Meeting and Community Meetings. Staff also participate and continue to study Stoney Literacy. We had our first round of Community Stoney Language Evening Classes from April to June 2019. All learners attended and continue to develop their capacity. We are having our second round of Community Stoney Language Evening Classes in Edmonton (YTC) from October 1 – November 5, 2019.	The dictionary AP is a work in progress. It is becoming a great resource for our Apprentice learners and Master Speakers who are learning how to read and write in Stoney. Kevin Alexis and Archie Bruno are the gate keepers for the AP. They are responsible for giving out passwords to members. Arlene Brenda Potts, Archie Bruno, and Lucas Alexis are in charge of the upkeep of the Stoney words.	Through our Masters Apprentice Program, we have two (2) Elder Consultants on our Advisory Committee and four (4) Master Speakers. These consultants will support the Department with various language revitalization projects.



We continue to have live teach-ins during PR Day (every last Monday of the month – Monthly Staff Meeting.)

EDUCATION – ALEXIS SCHOOL

We also work with Education to train and evaluate Stoney Teachers / Teacher Aids. We provide Language and Cultural instruction to orientate new staff and teachers and support the school with their language needs. We provide resources and training for Stoney Language Instructors and TA's.

Our community Stoney Class was a huge success. This was an Introductory Course to familiarize learners to the writing system. Classes took place from April 23, 2019 to June 11, 2019. There was a total of 7 evening classes every Tuesday for the past 8 weeks. Participants received a certificate and gathered for a feast honouring their participation.

The next session will take place at the Alexis Sub-Office (YTC Building, Edmonton) every Tuesday evenings (6 pm - 8 pm) beginning October 1, 2019 and ending November 1, 2019.

Best Practices – Capacity Building

On May 22, 2019 we travelled to Morley, Alberta to meet Morley and Paul Nakoda Nations to discuss best practices in language programming, literacy and curriculum development.

Best practices includes creating an engaging and learning environment where students have many opportunities to improve their language learning. Language experts advise:

- Make It Visual
- Build in More Group Work
- Communicate with Teacher Aids.
- Honor The "Silent Period."
- Allow Some Scaffolding with The Native Language.
- Look Out for Culturally Unique Vocabulary.
- Use Sentence Frames to Give Students Practice with Academic Language.

We are planning to host a Stoney Language Nakoda Summit / Teacher Training & Professional Development.

Together with other Stoney Tribes,. Our goal is to train teachers, collaborate, share resources and build our capacity as Stoney Speaking Nations.





Repatriation & Research Projects





Repatriation

We are working with Smithsonian to repatriate cultural items belonging to members of Alexis. Repatriation is the process whereby specific kinds of American Indian cultural items in a museum collection are returned to lineal descendants and culturally affiliated Indian tribes. Human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, and objects of cultural patrimony are all materials that may be considered for repatriation.



Historical Information Database

Alexis in Partnership with the Yellowhead Tribal Foundation has developed a database for genealogy purposes. The database will also be a repository for our Historical Information.

✓ **Step Four:** Formal Repatriation Request

✓ **Step Five:** Repatriation Research and Reporting

Alexis History & Archives – Research Projects Update on New Data Base System

UPDATE: In August of 2019, through a partnership agreement, Alexis Heritage & Language received a new data base system from the Yellowhead Tribal Development Foundation. This new system will help our department organize and maintain historical records using a digital platform.

→ Phase I: Research / Collecting Information (Ongoing)

→ Phase 2: Data Base System Development (Completed)

→ Phase 3: Organizing Records and Inputting Data (Ongoing)

Treaty is an important part of our history. As part of our Alexis Treaty Curriculum project, we are researching and visiting elders and documenting their Treaty stories. As well, we are going to research the TARR files located in Slave Lake, Alberta to gather information on Alexis. We hope to create a repository of Alexis Treaty documents for safekeeping and access for future generations to research.

Band records and agreements are an important part of our history. We included this section in our data base for historical purposes. We hope to create a repository of band archives to protect our interests and information.

We are currently researching death records of past relatives / ancestors. (Born in the I 800's-1900's) to keep track of our overall population. Alexis Membership maintains Treaty Registrations (birth records). This information is being stored in our data base system for safekeeping, historical purposes and when future generations want to research their lineage.

We have copies of Family Tree's from various Alexis Families. These records will be added to our new system (We also have Kinship Research forms available for members to include their family tree in the new data base system.) We have approximately 300 files retrieved from the Alberta Provincial Archives. (These records came from the Oblates of the Immaculate Mary regarding Alexis Families. These records verify the 1st generation of Alexis people that were documented and given First and Last - English/French names.) This information is being stored in our new data base system for historical purposes. When it is completed, future generations can research their lineage.

History provides identity. Alexis families have documents, photographs, and artifacts that tell stories of themselves and their families, and our community. We are collecting old pictures of all Alexis families. This information is provided to us voluntarily with consent of usage. We will store these records in our data base system for historical purposes, as well as creating resources for promoting Alexis history.










Jasper National Park Project Update

This project is ongoing.




HIGHLIGHTS August 6 – 9, 2019 @ Alexis School
